


I Hope We Choose Love

Discussion Questions

- 1. What do you think motivated Thom to share her story?
- 2. What did you think of voice and style? Did the quality of the writing match the story?
- 3. A persistent thread throughout the book is the idea of "goodness". How was "goodness" harmed communities like Thom's?
- 4. What does Thom mean by "performance of virtue"? How does it impact queer communities and other vulnerable groups?
- 5. Thom draws express distinctions between punishment, justice, and healing. How does she each of them?
- 6. What do you think can be done to build a safe community, free of bodily harm and intimate violence, especially against trans women of colour, who are among the most likely to be assaulted?
- 7. How did the book compare to other memoirs you've read?
- 8. How did the memoir make you reflect on your own life?
- 9. What did you learn from hearing Thom's story?
- 10. Are there any areas you wished the author had elaborated upon further?

Kai Cheng Thom is a writer, performance artist, and community healer in Toronto. She is the author of the novel *Fierce Femmes and Notorious Liars: A Dangerous Trans Girl's Confabulous Memoir* (Metonymy Press), the poetry collection a place called *No Homeland* (an American Library Association Stonewall Honor Book in 2018), and the children's picture book *From the Stars in the Sky to the Fish in the Sea,* illustrated by Kai Yun Ching and Wai-Yant Li. Her latest book is the essay collection *I Hope We Choose Love: A Trans Girl's Notes at the End of the World* (an American Library Association Stonewall Honor Book in 2020). Kai Cheng won the Writers' Trust of Canada's Dayne Ogilvie Prize for LGBTQ Emerging Writers in 2017.

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
